Interview Question Guide

Topic One: Training experiences in laparoscopic surgery

- **★** Can you briefly talk me through your career, specifically from the point of specializing in surgery?
- **★** How and when did you start practicing laparoscopic surgery?
 - -How were you trained in laparoscopy?
 - -Did you have any formal training? Did you learn on the job?
 - -Who introduced the laparoscopic technique to you?
 - -Talk me through the laparoscopic training programme(s) you have attended?
- **★** What did you think about the way you learnt laparoscopy?

Topic Two: Demand for/accessibility of laparoscopic training

- **★** Why did you start practicing laparoscopic surgery?
 - -Was it introduced to you or did you seek the skill yourself?
- **★** Do you think that there are a lot of rural surgeons trained in laparoscopy, or is it rare?
- ★ Amongst the rural surgeons who aren't trained in laparoscopy why do you think that is?
- **★** Do you think that there is a need for continued or increased use of laparoscopic surgery in rural India?
 - -If so/if not, why?
- **★** Do you think that there is a need for more doctors/surgeons like yourself to be trained in laparoscopic surgery?

 - -How about rural Indian surgeons specifically, versus those who may work in more urban/better resourced environments?
